On October 30th, **The Future of Democracy: Youth Engagement in a Digital World, webinar took place via online**, bringing together over **170 participants**. Led by TalTech University with the support of all E-Gov4Youth project partners, the event was a remarkable platform for exploring how digital tools can empower youth and enhance civic engagement.

The webinar featured the presentation of the **E-gov Research report** conducted in partner countries, providing valuable insights into youth participation through e-government tools.

Speakers from academia, public institutions, and international organizations shared their perspectives and the session was moderated by Arianna Jater (TalTech) and Project Lead Claudia Caggiano (Exeo Lab).

# Research report: Analysis of e- government best practices

The E-gov Research report has been published and explores the needs, expectations and challenges young people face in relation to e-governance services.

The report is divided into three sections, covering background research, best practices, and qualitative analysis of digital transformation journeys across Europe.

The report contains:

- A synthesis of research from six EU member states.
- Insights into best practices of e-government related to youth participation.
- Comparative analysis of youth and public authorities' perspectives on digital transformation.
- The report uncovers shared priorities like digital skills, user-friendly services, transparency, and security measures.
- The findings reveal a strong interest in digital transformation as a tool for bridging gaps between citizens and governments, encouraging active participation in society and democracy.

## COUNTRY TRENDS – E-GOV4YOUTH



70% youth are acquainted with the term e-government and 90% have used digital government services.



Norwegian youth revealed that despite the high degree of digital government service provision in Norway, there is relatively low awareness of e-government among youth (40.7% acquainted with the term).



Interviews revealed slow e-government progress. Youth cited limited knowledge and services, while public authorities pointed to data protection and interoperability issues.



100% of youth respondents reported having interacted with e-government, reflecting a high level digital literacy as well as extensive e-service provision by the state.



The urban-rural divide in e-government is a concern, along with the exclusion of the elderly, highlighting the country's struggle with digital access.



Trust in government is limited and there is a general great worry about data privacy among youth, the majority believe that e-government is an essential tool for democracy and civil participation.
